# The PSAT/NMSQT

## Preliminary SAT & National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test

- Exposure to SAT style questions and format before taking SAT in spring of junior year
- Score reporting with benchmarking and estimates for SAT performance
- Opportunity for recognition through National Merit Scholarship Competition

# PSAT Format

**Reading and Writing:** 64 minutes, 54 questions

- Two modules, evenly split

**Math:** 70 minutes, 44 questions

- Two modules, evenly split, with difficulty increasing within a module

Total time: 2 hours, 14 minutes

This is now the **same length** as the (Digital) SAT.

## Math

  - a. Linear equations and functions
2. Advanced Math

Trigonometry

  - permitted materials (e.g. pen/pencil, calculator)
  - prohibited materials (e.g. phones, smart watches, etc.)
  - breaks
  - dismissal
- Follow all proctor directions on the day of the test.
